WOODCHURCH is an ancient village and large parish, 6 miles north-west from Appledore, $4\frac{1}{2}$ west from Ham Street and $7\frac{1}{2}$ south-west from Ashford stations on the South Eastern railway and 5 east from Tenterden, in the Southern division of the county, hundreds of Blackborne and Aloesbridge, in the liberty of Romney Marsh, lathe of Scray, Ashford petty sessional division, Tenterden union and county court district, and in the rural deanery of South Lympe and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The church of All Saints consists of chancel with north and south chapels, nave, aisles, north porch and a western tower with spire containing a clock and 6 bells; it stands on high ground, on the borders of Shirley Moor, and was erected by one of the Woodchurches, an ancient family which took its name from this parish and exchanged it for that of Clark on succeeding to Mountford, in Kingsnorth: the church is a large building of stone, and its prevailing features are those of very good Early English, the interior being decidedly imposing; arcades of four arches on columns of polished Kentish rag alternately circular and octagonal divide the nave and aisles: the north porch has a parvise, with a staircase door opening into the north aisle, and a like staircase north of the chancel arch formerly led to an upper rood loft; a similar stone staircase (now used for pulpit steps) led to a lower rood loft: the chancel is a remarkably fine example of Early English work, and has three sedilia ascending eastward, a double piscina and on the north an aumbry: the tower is also Early English, but has a Decorated west window: the font is an Early one, with a bowl of black marble, sculptured with a rude Norman arcade, and stands on a cylindrical stem with shafts at the angles: there are also many ancient monuments to the Woodchurches, Clarkes, Harlakyndens and others: Sir Simon de Woodchurch, buried in this church, was one of the Kentish nobles knighted at the siege of Caerlaverock by Edward I. and surnamed "Malleus Scotorum," or "the hammer of the Scots:" Sir John Clarke, who distinguished himself at the battle of Poitiers, 19 Sept. 1356, is also buried here: in the south chapel is a fine Late tomb of marble to Sir Edward Waterhouse, Chancellor of the Exchequer in Ireland, knighted in 1584 by Sir John Perrott kt. lord deputy, ob. 1591: there is also the brass of a priest, said to be Nichol de Gore, with effigy and an inscription in French in Lombardic characters, circ. 1320; and there are other brasses to

den esq. ob. 1558, and Elizabeth (Watno), his wife, ob. 1539; and Margaret, his wife, with 10 children; Roger Harlakyn-den esq. ob. 1523; and Martin Harlakinden esq. 1584 & Deborah (Whetenhall) his wife: there is a memorial window to Mr. Smeeth, for many years churchwarden: the church was restored in 1846, and has 420 sittings, all being free. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1539; marriages and burials from 1538. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £537, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1889 by the Rev. Andrew Welch. There are Wesleyan and Bible Christian chapels. In some excavations in the parish traces of a Roman road were discovered. The charities amount to £28 yearly. Hengherst, the residence of Arthur Thomas Schreiber esq. J.P. is pleasantly situated in a park, surrounded by woods, plantations and grounds tastefully laid out. Col. Herbert George Deedes J.P. of Sandling Park, is lord of the manor. There are several landowners. The soil is heavy; subsoil, clayey. The chief crops are wheat, beans and oats, and there are about 80 acres of hops. The area is 6,982 acres; rateable value, £6,088; the population in 1881 was 1,240.

HARLACKENDEN and PLURENDEN are 2 miles north; BROOK STREET, 1 mile south-west; REDBROOK STREET, 1 mile north.
