WOMENSWOOLD (or Wymynswold) is a small village and parish, three-quarters of a mile to the north of the Dover road, 2½ miles south from Adisham station on the Canterbury and Dover line of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 1½ miles north-east from Barham station on the Canterbury and Dover section of the same railway, 7 south-east from Canterbury, 10½ west from Deal, and 8½ north-west from Dover, in the Canterbury division of the county, Wingham hundred and petty sessional division, lathe of St. Augustine, Bridge union, Canterbury county court district, and in the rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry of Canterbury. The parish church of St. Margaret is of flint and stone, chiefly in the Early English style, and has a tower containing one bell: there are several memorial windows, and ancient monuments of the Winchester, Nethersole and other families: the church was restored in 1870, and has 151 sittings. The register dates from the year 1574. The living is a vicarage, net income £180, including 2 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Gabriel Stokes B.A. of Pembroke College, Cam-

bridge. There is a Baptist chapel at Woolwich, erected in 1887. The principal landowners are J. Edward Allen esq. J.P. Henry Western Plumtre esq. and Henry Fitzwalter Plumtre esq. The soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 1,722 acres; rateable value, £1,461; the population in 1911 was 271 in the civil and 232 in the ecclesiastical parish.

By Local Government Board Order 23,641, dated 24 March, 1889, a detached part of this parish, including Denne Hill Mansion and grounds, were transferred from Kingstone to this parish; the house known as Denne Hill is now the property of J. Edward Allen esq. J.P. and the residence of Major Stanley Edward Allen.

WOODCHURCH is an ancient village and large parish, 6 miles north from Appledore, 4½ west from Ham Street and 7½ south-west from Ashford stations on the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 4½ east from Tenterden and 55 from London, in the Ashford division of the county, hundreds of Blackborne and Aloesbridge, in the liberty of Romney Marsh, lathe of Scray, Ashford petty sessional division, Tenterden union and county court district, and in the rural deanery of South Lympne and archdeaconry of Canterbury. The church of All Saints is of stone, chiefly in the Early English style, and has a tower with spire containing a clock and 6 bells: there are many ancient monuments to the Clarkes, Harlakyndens and others, a fine tomb to Sir Edward Waterhouse, Chancellor of the Exchequer in Ireland, 1591, several brasses, including one dated 1320 and bearing a Flemish-Latin inscription in memory of

Nicholas de Goré, and two memorial windows: the church was restored in 1846, and has 350 sittings. There is a churchyard cross, which was erected in 1919, in memory of Woodchurch men who gave their lives in the Great War. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1539; marriages and burials from 1538. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £600, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1921 by the Rev. Cuthbert Ellidge Owtram M.A. of Worcester College, Oxford. There are Wesleyan and United Methodist chapels, and a Mission Room on Chapel hill. The local charities amount to £31 yearly. Traces of a Roman road have been met with in the parish. Hengherst, the residence of Capt. Somerset Edward Deane Webb J.P. is pleasantly seated in a park of 152 acres, surrounded by woods and plantations, and has tastefully laid-out grounds. Charles

Evans Thomas-Medhurst esq. is lord of the manor of Great Engham, and there are several landowners. The soil is heavy; subsoil, clayey. The chief crops are wheat, beans and oats, and there are about 60 acres of hops. The area is 6,948 acres gr. 16p. of land and 4 of water; rateable value, £7,124; the population in 1911 was 1,059.

WOODLANDS is an ecclesiastical parish, formed from the civil parishes of Wrotham and Shoreham in 1850, 2½ miles north of Kemsing and 2½ from Otford stations on the Maidstone branch of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, and 6 north-east from Sevenoaks, in the Sevenoaks division of the county, lathe of Sutton-at-Hone, hundred of Codsheath, petty sessional division of Malling, union of Malling, county court district of Sevenoaks, and in the rural deanery of Shoreham, arch-deaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. The parish is supplied with water by the Mid-Kent Water Co. The church of St. Mary, a building of flint in the Early English style, stands on the site of a former church: it was restored in 1910, and has a belfry con-
