**WOMENSWOULD** (or Wymynswold) is a small vil-  
lage and parish, three-quarters of a mile to the north of  
the Dover road, 2½ miles south from Adisham station  
on the Canterbury and Dover line of the Southern rail-  
way, 1½ miles north-east from Barham station on the  
Canterbury and Dover section of the same railway, 7  
south-east from Canterbury, 10½ west from Deal, and  
8½ north-west from Dover, in the Canterbury division  
of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of  
Wingham, lathe of St. Augustine, union of Bridge,  
county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of  
East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canter-  
bury. The parish church of St. Margaret is of flint and  
stone, chiefly in the Early English style, and has a  
tower containing one bell: there are several memorial  
windows, and ancient monuments to the Winchester,  
Nethersole and other families: the church was restored  
in 1870, and has 151 sittings. The register dates from  
the year 1574. The living is a vicarage, net yearly  
value £350, including 2 acres of glebe and residence, in

the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since  
1930 by the Rev. James Cartlidge. There is a Baptist  
chapel at Woolwich, erected in 1887. The principal  
landowners are Maj. Stanley Edward Allen, Henry  
Western Plumtre esq. J.P. and Lord FitzWalter. The  
soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are  
wheat, oats and barley. The area is 1,722 acres; the  
population of the civil parish in 1921 was 314, and of  
the ecclesiastical, 275.

By Local Government Board Order 23,641, dated 24  
March, 1889, a detached part of this parish, including  
Denne Hill Mansion and grounds, were transferred from  
Kingstone to this parish; the house known as Denne  
Hill is now the property and residence of Major Stanley  
Edward Allen.

**WOODCHURCH** is an ancient village and large  
parish, 6 miles north from Appledore, 4½ west from  
Ham Street and 7½ south-west from Ashford station on  
the South Eastern section of the Southern railway, 4½  
east from Tenterden and 55 from London, in the Ash-  
ford division of the county, hundreds of Blackborne and  
Aloesbridge, in the liberty of Romney Marsh, lathe of  
Scray, petty sessional division of Ashford, union and  
county court district of Tenterden, and in the rural  
deanery of South Lympne, archdeaconry of Maidstone  
and diocese of Canterbury. The church of All Saints is  
of stone, chiefly in the Early English style, and has a  
tower, with spire, containing a clock and 6 bells: there  
are many ancient monuments to the Clarkes, Harlakyn-  
dens and others, a fine tomb to Sir Edward Waterhouse,  
Chancellor of the Exchequer in Ireland, 1591, several  
brasses, including one dated 1320 and bearing a  
Flemish-Latin inscription in memory of Nicholas de  
Goré, and two memorial windows: the church was  
restored in 1846, and has 350 sittings. In the church-  
yard is a cross, erected in 1919 as a memorial to the  
men of the parish who gave their lives in the Great  
War, 1914-18. The register of baptisms dates from the  
year 1539; marriages and burials from 1538. The  
living is a rectory, net yearly value £611, including 18

acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Arch-  
bishop of Canterbury, and held since 1922 by the Rev.  
Cuthbert Ellidge Owtram M.A. of Worcester College,  
Oxford. There are Wesleyan and United Methodist  
chapels, and a Mission Room on Chapel hill. The local  
charities amount to £31 yearly. Traces of a Roman  
road have been met with in the parish. Hengherst,  
the residence of Capt. Somerset Edward Deane Webb  
J.P. is pleasantly seated in a park of 152 acres, sur-  
rounded by woods and plantations, and has tastefully  
laid-out grounds. Charles Evans Thomas-Medhurst  
esq. is lord of the manor, and there are several land-  
owners. The soil is heavy; subsoil, clayey. The chief  
crops are wheat, beans and oats, and there are about 60  
acres of hops. The area is 7,002 acres 3r. 16p. of land  
and 4 of water; the population in 1921 was 1,044.

**WOODLANDS** is an ecclesiastical parish, formed from the civil parishes of Wrotham and Shoreham in 1850, 2½ miles north of Kemsing and 2½ from Otford station on the Maidstone branch of the Southern railway, and 6 north-east from Sevenoaks, in the Sevenoaks division of the county, lathe of Sutton-at-Hone, hundred of Codsheath, petty sessional division and union of Malling, county court district of Sevenoaks, and in the rural deanery of Shoreham, archdeaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. The parish is supplied with water by the Mid-Kent Water Co. The church of St. Mary, a building of flint in the Early English style, stands on the site of a former church: it was restored

in 1910, and has a belfry containing one bell: there are 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1850. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £316, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Rochester, and held since 1927 by the Rev. Robert Reginald Milner B.A. of Durham University. The Woodlands Manor Golf Club has an 18-hole course and a 9-hole pitching and putting course. The principal landowners are Lord Dunsany, S. H. Alston esq. and Sir Mark E. Collet bart. D.L., J.P. The soil is chalk and clay; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are barley, oats and cereals; the population in 1921 was 81. Letters through Kemsing, nearest M. O. & T. office

**WOODNESBOROUGH**, a parish and village, deriving its name from Woden, is on a Roman road, at the foot of a spur of a chain of hills which command an extensive view of the surrounding country; it is a mile and a half south-west from Sandwich station, on the Dover and Margate section of the Southern railway, in the Dover division of the county, lower half hundred and union of Eastry, lathe of St. Augustine, petty sessional division of Wingham, county court district of Deal, rural deanery of Sandwich and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The waterworks of the Sandwich Corporation are in this parish, and include a reservoir with a capacity of over 150,000 gallons. The ancient church of St. Mary the Virgin, dating from 1180, is of stone in the Early English and Perpendicular styles, and has a tower containing 5 bells: in the chancel are two brasses: the church was partially restored in 1884, but the work was completed in 1909, and it has 258 sittings. In the churchyard is a sun-dial dated 1738, and a granite monument, erected in 1920, to the memory of the men of the parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The register dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £430, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Henry Lonsdale Boldero, of the London University. Mrs. Sarah Stewart, of Woodnesborough, by will dated February 6th, 1835, left the sum of £700, now in 2½ per cent. Consols, the interest of which is distributed annually amongst the most deserving and necessitous poor of this parish, professing the religion of the Established Church.

The Polders, on the borders of the marshes to the north-east, received their name from the Flemish settlers at Sandwich in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, "Polders" being the name which is still applied to the rich marshy meadows of the Netherlands; these settlers introduced the manufacture of baize and other woollen stuffs, and the cultivation of vegetables, flax and canary seed. On Woodnesborough Hill great quantities of Saxon antiquities have been found at different periods. Poulton House, in this parish, is an extremely fine specimen of 17th century architecture, having been built by Col. Kean in 1629; and this date and a coat of arms still remain on one of the walls; portions of the original building are still in good preservation, and include a secret hiding place. The house was formerly surrounded by a moat with a drawbridge. Mr. Horace Armstrong is lord and owner of the Parsonage manor; the great tithes are held by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners. The farmers are the principal landowners. The soil is sandy loam; subsoil, sand and chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats, hops, fruit and general garden produce. The area is 2,939 acres of land, 2 of inland and 1 of tidal water and 1 of foreshore; the population in 1921 was 965. Woodnesborough and Marshborough seem to have been Roman towns or villages.
