HERNE BAY AND HERNE STREET.

HERNE BAY is situated on a point of the coast, nearly equal in distance between Whitstable and Reculver, six miles from Canterbury, and sixteen from Margate. It has latterly obtained some notice as a place of resort for bathing; the water is clear, and the sea view extremely pleasing; the buildings are good, and increasing in number, while the air of tranquility that pervades this spot, make it preferred by many, to the gay and more tumultuous watering places. In the channel, not far distant from the bay, is "Pan Rock," much dreaded by navigators.

but of great celebrity among antiquaries, on account of the numerous fragments of Roman earthenware found here by the oyster dredgers. It is supposed these relics are the vestiges of a cargo of pottery, wrecked, whilst the Romans held dominion over Britain.

HERNE STREET, or the village of Herne, is about two miles distant from the bay, inland; pleasantly situated, with an ancient church and tower. A pleasure fair is held here on Easter Monday. Herne, or Hearn parish, contained in 1821, 1675 inhabitants.

HIGH HALDEN, ALDINGTON, BILSINGTON,

HIGH HALDEN is a small parish, three miles from Tenterden, twenty-four from Canterbury, and eighteen from Maidstone. A few houses round the church forms the village: this edifice built about the thirteenth century is small, but convenient, with a steeple of British oak, shingled on the outside. In the further quarter of the parish are two small manufactories of a coarse kind of earthenware.

ALDINGTON is a larger parish, seven miles from Hythe and Ashford. The church is very old, with a square tower and six bells.

BILSINGTON is a parish thinly inhabited for its size. The royal military canal from Hythe to Rye, runs through here, and on its banks stand the church, which is small and convenient. It is seven

miles and a half from Ashford, and twelve from Tenterden.

BONNINGTON is an adjoining parish to the above, and also admits the royal military canal through it. On its banks is the church, which is very small.

ORLESTONE is a parish on the road from Lydd and Romney to Ashford, and contains the small village, called Ham Street, where the little business that is done is transacted. The church is a very old low building, about a mile from Ham Street. It is six miles and a half from Ashford and nine from Tenterden.

RUCKINGE is a tolerably sized parish, principally wood land, seven miles from Romney and Ashford,

and eleven from Tenterden. The village is small, with a church, an old inconvenient structure.

SHADOXHURST is a small well wooded parish, seven miles from Tenterden and five from Ashford. The church is a very old building, the interior of which is neat and clean; it has a monument to Sir Charles Molloy, bart. which in point of workmanship has few equals.

WAREHORNE is an inconsiderable parish, with a few houses round a green. The church is of stone, with a brick tower. A fair is held here on the 2nd of October, for cattle, which was formerly well attended. The Sussex farmers are principally supplied with hop poles from this part. It is seven miles from Tenterden and eight from Ashford.

HYTHE.

A Cinque port and corporation town pleasantly seated on the coast of Kent, sixty-six miles from London, thirty-one from Maidstone, and twelve from Dover. The situation is fertile and desirable; there is considerable business done in corn, hops, &c. The principal object of curiosity at this place is a charnel-house with a large pile of human bones; the conjecture adopted regarding these relics is, that they are the remains of Britons slain in a bloody battle fought on the shore between this place and Folkestone, with the retreating Saxons, in the year 456, and to have obtained their whiteness by lying exposed on the shore. The church, situated very prominently on the side of the cliff, is an ancient and venerable structure, displaying several orders of architecture, partly Roman, evidently the work of various and distant periods: the chancel is of great beauty, having been some years since, renovated under the direction of the rector, now archdeacon of Canterbury. There are also places of worship for independent methodists, Calvinists, and catholics. The charitable foundations of St. Bartholomew, and St. John, afford a comfortable retreat to both men and women. the revenue from the former arises from about one hundred acres of land, and of the latter about fifty acres in this and the adjoining parishes. The royal military canal, extending from Shorncliffe nearly to Rye in Sussex, passes through this town, and affords a desirable communication for transporting goods and merchan-

dise. A passage-boat plies daily between Hythe and Rye. The barracks of the royal staff corps, at the entrance of the town from the London road, are neat and substantial buildings; and this being the permanent station of that respectable corps, the society of the place is much improved by its officers. The library of Mr. Tiffen is well furnished, and his reading-room frequented by the principal inhabitants. The theatre, though not large, is neat, and well managed by Mr. Beverly, the proprietor. The general sessions and gaol delivery is held about July, and the adjourned sessions of the mayor and jurats monthly, on Saturday: as also a court of record monthly, on Saturday. Meetings of the county magistrates of the Eltham division take place at the Swan Inn, on the third Monday in each month. The town is governed by a mayor and jurats, who with the common council and freemen, elect two representatives to serve in parliament—they are Sir R. T. Farquhar, bart. and S. Marjoribanks, esq. the total number of voters is 346. Here are machines for bathing, which upon this part of the coast is very good; and the coast has an interesting appearance, lined with Martello towers and formidable forts. The walks and rides about the town and neighbourhood are varied, romantic and delightful. A good corn market is held on Thursday, and fairs on the 10th of July and the 1st of December, for horses, cattle, and pedlary. According to the census in 1821 the population was 2181.
